Tamahere-Woodlands Councillors' update July 2023: celebrating diversity

Waikato District Council has taken the step to hang the portraits of both Kiingi Tūheitia Potatau Te Wherowhero VII and King Charles III in the Council Chamber.

Celebrating diversity

Following the recent coronation of Charles III the unveiling of both portraits was coordinated to celebrate the diversity of Waikato district's communities, and to show the council's commitment to creating liveable, thriving and connected communities. Waikato District Council is the first and only Council to honour the Kiingitanga by having the Maaori King's portrait hanging in Chambers.

The Chamber also looks different in this triennium as councillors sit in a semi-circle facing the public gallery – not sitting with their backs to the public. The new seating arrangements make it a more inclusive place for people attending meetings or making submissions at hearings.

Community catch-up

We've invited community boards and the larger community committees to the first of a series of general 'catch-up' sessions with Council – and now it's the turn for smaller community and hall committees to hear about the Council's planning processes and have a say about how we might all work better together.

Councillors and senior staff have set aside time on Tuesday 11 July and invitations have gone out to community committees and hall committees around the district to send representatives to attend. We hope to see you there.

Blueprints

Meanwhile, thanks to all community committees who responded to the Blueprints survey so that the Council's next Long Term Plan 2024-34 can be informed by an up-to-date understanding of community aspirations. There will be more opportunity to provide feedback on the LTP early next year.

Future for Local Government

After two years' of consultation the final report from the Future for Local Government review panel has concluded that the relationship between local and central government needs a reset. Among its recommendations are new funding solutions to relieve pressure on rates, such as the Government paying council rates on land used for schools, hospitals and conservation estate, and providing councils a share of locally raised GST. New election methods and four-year terms are also recommended. No decisions are expected before this year's national elections.

Local heritage

The Tamahere-Woodlands Heritage Forum is developing a website to gather photos and records of how our communities have developed over the years. Please make contact if you can help.

The Forum has also been developing some heritage signs for each community in the Ward with support from the Council. The first of these have now been installed in Puketaha near the school, and at Eureka near the hall. Others are on the way.

Resource consent pre-application service

The Council's Resource Consent pre-application service is available again. It was paused in March last year, while staff dealt with large numbers of consent applications and the impacts of Covid-19. The pre-application service is offered to:

- Help you understand if you need a consent.
- Help you understand what to include in a resource consent application.
- Identify any potential issues with your proposal.

At this stage the service is only providing written advice, but a request for a pre-application meeting will be considered once an application and supporting documentation is received and Council staff have a better understanding of the level and scale of advice needed.

There is a lot happening in the resource consenting space with the release of the Proposed District Plan – Appeals Version, Variation 3 to the Proposed District Plan relating to the Medium Density Residential standards and new legislation coming into effect. The service can help provide some direction on these and other matters. To find out more, go to the Council's website and search for 'pre-application service'.
